Sample Personal Statement: Business

"That's not right." "We're going to have to change things up." "This could really turn into something." "How about that!"

I can still hear the voices of my father, his thoughts almost overlapping, as he focused on how to grow his business, how to fix problems, and how to keep moving forward. When I later studied business in school, I learned the technical aspects, the theories, several dry subjects and often tedious tasks. But this was not the business world inhabited by my father. His was a world full of exciting challenges. He seized opportunities when they arose and worked to create opportunities where there were none. He was always visibly proud that I emulated his career goals, yet he wanted so much more for me. This, in its core, is what Exeter represents.
